The inaugural meeting was held at St Giles-in-the-Fields, London on October 26th 1912, and although but 15 attended yet I had received letters from 40 ladies who were anxious to become members. The meeting was a success in every way. The following officers were elected:- President, Miss Alice White; Honorary Secretary & Treasurer, Miss Edith K Parker; Committee: Northern District: Miss Lillian Wilson, who is now Mrs T. H. Hardy; Eastern District: Miss Evelyn Steel; Western District: Miss Nellie Gillingham; Southern District: Miss Eva N. Belcher; and Midland District: Miss Sarah Pigott."

During 2012 The Ladies Guild will be celebrating its Centenary Year with quarters and peals. We will have a celebration day on 28th April which will start, just as our very first meeting did, at St Giles-in-the-Fields and end with a celebration Service at Cubitt Town. There will be a ringing holiday in Northamptonshire at the end of June, leading up to our Centenary Dinner and AGM. We have special sweatshirts and other merchandise displaying our 2012 logo. Royal Jubilee Bells for the Diamond Jubilee River Pageant

On Wednesday, 18th January, the organisers of the Thames Diamond Jubilee Pageant revealed the major details of the 1,000-boat tribute to Her Majesty The Queen's 60-year reign. One of the largest public events ever held in London, the Pageant will take place on Sunday, 3rd June – on the river from Putney to Tower Bridge.

The flotilla itself will be over seven miles long and including mustering, dispersal and the avenue of sail will include some 25 miles of Thames river bank and pass under 14 bridges. It will take 90 minutes to pass any given point.

This unique spectacle, inspired by a rich history and tradition of entertainment and theatre on the Thames, is expected to include 20,000 participants on the water, millions of spectators on the river banks and Londons public spaces and a global audience expected by the major broadcasters to number many hundreds of millions.

The pageant will be led by a new ring of 8 bells, tenor 9½cwt, hung for full circle ringing in a tower 5½m above the river. They are due to be cast at the Whitechapel Bell Foundry next month and have already been granted the title "Royal Jubilee Bells" by Buckingham Palace. They will be rung by members of the Ancient Society of College Youths who, weather permitting, will attempt a guarter peal.

The Queen will launch the Pageant at 3pm on Sunday, 3rd June, which is the point when the Royal Jubilee Bells will start ringing. Bells in the towers along the banks of the River Thames will also start ringing at 3pm, some for general ringing, others for quarter peals, and others for full peals. Towers elsewhere in London and further afield are also invited to ring their bells at 3pm for this occasion, either as a touch, quarter or peal. Details of all ringing planned will be collated and published together by the River Pageant Trust and in The Ringing World. Details of performances will also be recorded in the ringing room of St James, Garlickhythe, which is where the Royal Jubilee Bells will find their long term home.
